TONY'S STORY

Tony Blackwell was incarcerated for nearly 45 years and during that time, he worked in Maryland Correctional Enterprises' (MCE) plants intermittently from 1982 until 2019— learning trades and valuable skills. Throughout his time, Tony worked at the Graphics Plant, Wood Plant and one of our Sewing Plants – acquiring skills such as printing, graphic arts and general office skills. With 12-13 years' experience working in our Graphics Plant, Tony was able to secure a job post release working at Uptown Press, a successful printing company in the Baltimore Metropolitan Area that has been a fixture in the community for over 60 years. He's working in free press as a Digital Copier Operator, operating four copiers and binderies. Immediately following release, Tony was able to obtain stability utilizing saved earnings from MCE until he was able to find gainful employment in a field he had already excelled in for many years.
